Welcome Back!

A huge welcome back to all of our pupils in school, you have all been a huge miss and the way you have all skipped in and joined into your classes has been a joy to behold. Year 5 & Year 6, we cannot wait until Monday 15th March, when you will all be together again too. Thank you also to the parents and families who have worked so hard with their children during the most recent lockdown, please know that whatever you have been able to do, however big or small has certainly helped all of our children return so positively. Once again, please be reassured that all staff are keeping the emotional well-being of your children in the forefront of their minds as they return and all staff are committed to working with your children to help them make the best of their return and the rest of this academic year, despite COVID-19.

Attendance

Now that school is fully open again, schools have once been asked by the Government to track and report on attendance. If your child is isolating at home due to COVID-19, under instruction from the school, they will always be counted positively, so please do not worry about that. This week, our whole school attendance has been 98.1% which is excellent.

Drop off and collection arrangements

Pupils should be being dropped off and/or collected by only ONE person, this week the number of family groups coming onto the school grounds has reduced and I really appreciate your support with this. Please only arrive at your child's time slot.

Facemask wearing on school premises

Whilst we continue to educate your children, under the government guidance on COVID-19, all adults collecting children, for the 5-10mins they are on school premises are asked to wear a face mask. The mask is not about protecting yourself, it is about protecting others around you and reducing the spread of COVID-19. As many of you will have seen, a large number of the adults collecting after school are grandparents and by you wearing a mask you are helping to protect them. I appreciate that mask wearing is not the most pleasant, however for the short time you are on school grounds and mixing with other adults during the collection time, the schools risk assessment, which has been approved by the Local Authority, all the unions, governors and staff states that adults entering school grounds must wear masks, unless medically exempt.

To all the adults who are helping us by wearing a mask, I appreciate your support, and to the small minority who simply refuse because they don't believe in masks, I ask that you think about your parents and your child's grandparents being protected, please wear a mask for the short time you are on school grounds. Those adults who are exempt, I appreciate you wearing your lanyard, denoting that so you will not be asked to wear a mask.

Mother's Day Cards

All pupils were offered the opportunity to make a Mother's Day card for a Mum or Grandmother at the start of the week. They have then been quarantined ready to be sent home today. I felt it was really important to give the children the chance to say thank you to their parents and talk about what they have appreciated most about their families during the most recent lockdown. You would have all been so proud of the things they said and the love and emotion they feel for all of you, so to the Mum's and of course dads out there – a huge thank you from all of us and your children for being so amazing!

Golden Book Assembly

I am continuing with the new Golden Book Assemblies, but this week I have had the privilege of speaking to every class individually and speak to each child in person. It is wonderful to see how proud the children are – if your child comes out with a Golden Book Head Teacher Award sticker then please ask them how amazing they have been; you will be so proud. Now, as the children are all back in school, every week 2 children per class will come home with a Golden Book Award sticker – please keep an eye out for when it is your child!

To everyone who has managed their recent 10-day isolations, please give yourselves and your families a huge round of applause. You have been amazing and the engagement on Teams has been super, so you should all be really proud of yourselves.

World Book Day

Last week, the staff uploaded 'Masked reader' video clips – could your child guess who they were? There were some amazing clips and so I look forward to hearing all about your ideas of who read which book! Since the children have been back in school we have heard some wonderful ways in which you all thought about and celebrated world book day, keep up all the good work!

Year of St Joseph

An Introduction to the Year of St Joseph; in his Apostolic Letter entitled <u>Patris corde</u> ("With a Father's Heart"), marking the 150th anniversary of Blessed Pope Pius IX's declaration of St Joseph as Patron of the Universal Church, Pope Francis has proclaimed a special "Year of St Joseph," beginning on the Solemnity of the Immaculate Conception, December 8 2020 and extending to the same feast in 2021. The Year of St Joseph is being launched in schools in the Diocese of Hexham and Newcastle from March 2021 in time to celebrate Joseph's feast day on 19 March. In the Apostolic Letter Pope Francis describes Saint Joseph as a beloved father, a tender and loving father, an obedient father, an accepting father; a father who is creatively courageous, a working father, a father in the shadows. We will be celebrating each of those attributes through liturgical prayer each month, reflecting on the Gospel stories about Joseph and commemorating his feast days.

Maybe with all of our collective prayers, the vaccine will bring some much longed for light at the end of the tunnel. Hopefully, soon we can start meeting friends, families and reconnect with loved ones. I continue to keep you and all of your families in my thoughts and prayers during this challenging time, as we are not quite there yet.
